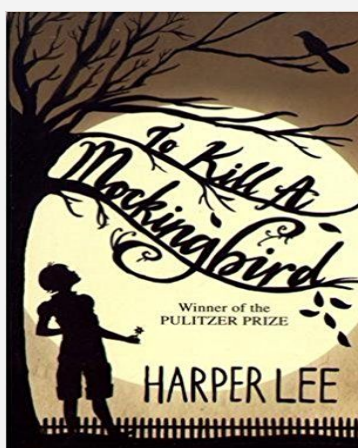


Book of the Week

The fossa is a cat-like, carnivorous mammal endemic to Madagascar. It is a member of the Eupleridae, a family of carnivorans closely related to the mongoose family. A adult fossa can weigh 21lb, and they can be as long as 2.4ft. Fossas are not exactly friendly in the wild. They are known to be the top predators in Madagascar and they hunt both during day and during night. Also in the wild, fossas are mainly solitary. With the exception of mothers with young and brief pairings during the breeding season, fossas are solitary animals. They patrol and defend territories as large as four square kilometers.

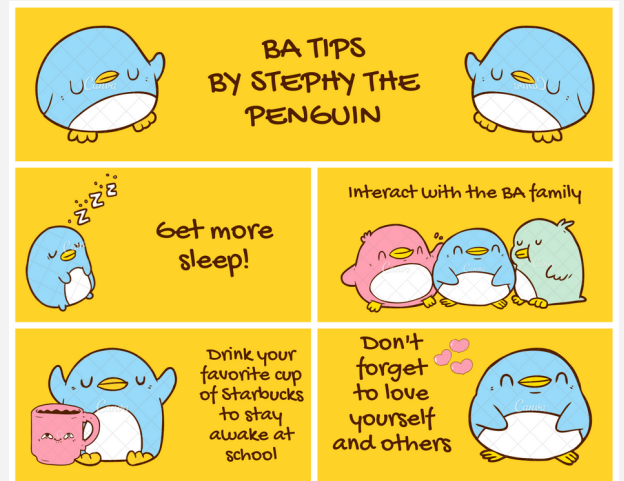
